<b>SUBMERSION RELATED TO NON-POOL &amp; NON- SPA PRODUCTS (buckets, tubs, containers...)</b>	<b>434</b> (children under 5, 2006-2010)	<b>233</b> (children under 5, 2006-2010)
<b>BICYCLES</b>	<b>19</b> (children 19 and under, 2013)	<b>531,340</b> (bikes and accessories, 2013)

<b>FIREWORKS</b>	<b>11</b> (nonoccupational, 2014)	<b>10,500</b> (estimated, 2014) (est. 35% involved children under 15)
<b>MINI-HAMMOCK HAZARDS</b>	<b>12</b> (children due to strangulation, since 1984)	—
<b>SOCCER GOALS</b>	<b>35</b> (minimum, since 1979)	<b>56</b> (minimum, 1979-2009)
<b>TRAMPOLINES</b>	<b>22</b> (2000-2009)	<b>104,691</b> (estimated, 2014)
<b>BLEACHERS</b>	<b>19</b> (1980-2003)	<b>20,324</b> (estimated, 2008)
<b>WINDOW FALLS</b>	<b>8</b> (children under 5, average EACH YEAR)	<b>3,300</b> (children under 5, estimated EACH YEAR)
